A year of solidarity

Welcome to our 2014 Annual Review. All of us at HelpAge International were shocked at the extent of the loss of life and damage caused by Typhoon Haiyan in the Philippines last November, one of the strongest typhoons ever recorded.

The HelpAge response made us truly proud. Staff and older volunteers of COSE, our Filipino Affiliate, were quick to deliver food and shelter to those worst affected and sat with older people in hospitals to offer them comfort. Our response was only made possible because members of the HelpAge network across the world came together to raise funds and show solidarity.

We can look back with equal pride on a year in which we launched the first global index to rank countries according to the social and economic wellbeing of their older populations. The Global AgeWatch Index stimulated widespread public debate, new research studies, and the establishment of new forums to monitor progress and recommend ways forward.

The HelpAge network, now 111 members strong, has campaigned vigorously for several years for a UN convention on the rights of older people. The past year saw concrete progress towards this goal, with the appointment of the first UN Independent Expert on the rights of older people. At the grass roots level, 228,000 activists in 60 countries took part in our Age Demands Action campaign through which older people voice their concerns to their governments.

In the past year, together with our partners, we delivered healthcare, income generation and emergency relief to 1.5 million of the poorest or most vulnerable older people and their families, and supported 3,000 older people's associations.

We successfully maintained our income at £26.4 million. As we develop our Strategy to 2020, there is so much more to do. We will continue to devote every effort to ensuring that people are not forgotten by their governments or the international community when they become older.

We would like to express our heartfelt thanks to our dedicated and experienced staff, donors, Affiliates, partners, and all the older women and men we work with for making this year's impressive achievements possible.

Reaching people

This year HelpAge reached 1.5 million older people – an increase of 75 per cent on the previous year – with essential services such as healthcare, income generation and emergency response. Our work at the community level is also critical for generating evidence to present to governments and policy makers which gives us legitimacy to speak and campaign on behalf of older people.

This year we:

- reached 1.5 million of the world's vulnerable older people and their families – supporting work in 45 countries with 500 partners
- supported 3,000 older people's associations with training, grants and agricultural supplies
- helped more than 200,000 people affected by Typhoon Haiyan and 100,000 people in Ethiopia and Kenya affected by drought and refugee crises
- coordinated three global Age Demands Action campaign events, with 228,000 activists taking part in 60 countries
- contributed to improved pension schemes in 14 countries, with 1.35 million more older people eligible
- helped 250,000 older people to access health services including eye tests for 135,000 older people, resulting in 50,000 treatments.

The right tools for our work

Ten more organisations joined the HelpAge network as Affiliates bringing the total to 111.

Eva Sabdono (pictured). Executive Director of Yavasan Emong Lansia (YEL) in Indonesia, explains the benefits of YEL's relationship with HelpAge:

"YEL was founded in 1996 as a nonprofit organisation with a mission to improve the quality of life of poor older people in Indonesia. We try to achieve our mission through various programmes, such as homecare services, emergency response, training volunteers and caregivers on ageing issues, and advocacy at the local and national level.

We became an Affiliate of HelpAge International in 2010. Belonging to the HelpAge network has helped us tremendously in implementing our programmes, especially in raising awareness on ageing issues, and advocacy with policy makers, communities and older people themselves.

We are a small organisation but our own network became much larger at the national and global level because of our affiliation. And HelpAge's publications, workshops, expertise and continued moral support give us the tools to do our work in the best possible wav.

There is still a lot of advocacy to be done to put ageing as a priority in the post-2015 development agenda, but we are sure where there is a will, there is a way."

Self preservation

The Awa indigenous communities in the south of Colombia have been badly affected by internal armed conflict. But a HelpAge health and livelihoods programme is improving their everyday life while helping to preserve their culture say Mercedes, 68, and Erminzul, 64 (pictured).

Mercedes and Erminzul have nine children. In the past the family built a fish pond but after heavy rains the pond overflowed and they lost all the fish.

Erminzul explains how the HelpAge programme is helping them:

"The first time we bought the fish was because we had some savings but after the overflowing we lost the fish and our money.

After we lost the fish the pond was abandoned. But two months ago we received the new fish and it was a very nice surprise. My children helped me get the pond ready and now it is much better. Without the project we could not have recovered the fish. We would have lost it all – our savings gone.

We feed the fish three times a day with fruit and concentrate that we get through the project. In two months we will take them out and sell them, but leave the biggest so they can reproduce and the project can keep going.

We live well. Our children are always watching us and I help care for my mum, who is about 82, and lives close by with my sister. My children like to help her also and with this project they are watching over us more than before.

I really like this project because it takes care of older people – we are the only ones that can preserve our culture and transfer knowledge and you recognise this by giving us special attention and working for us."

One of the couple's sons Andrés added:


"We have grown in this land and we will work to stay here. Our family is a mixture of races but our heart is indigenous and because of that we respect older people very much. We love our parents and grandmother and being part of this project together has strengthened our ties with them and all older people in the community."




Finance


Where our money came from £26.4 million








